

Asiantation Mentoring Program



First Year Excellence in Innovation Award

First Year Excellence in Innovation Award stems from a university-wide initiative to cultivate talent among first year students. This award recognizes a current first year student(s) that has displayed a significant level of innovation and creativity. Gant, former Provost and Professor of Civil Engineering. Edward V. Gant, who also served as the University's acting president for brief periods in the 1960s and '70s, passed away in 1985. The scholarship is granted on the basis of academic excellence, professional potential, dedicated service, and exemplary integrity. The scholarship(s) are awarded to students, graduate and/or undergraduate, who will be continuing their studies at the University of Connecticut next fall.


Paige Collins


Boya Yuan

Organization Community Service Award

This award honors a Registered Student Organization that has initiated and/or actively engaged in a community service project that offered direct service, as opposed to fundraising or lobbying activities, to a community external to the University. This award was established in 2002 and is sponsored by the Office of Community Outreach.

Engineers Without Borders

Engineers Without Borders is a student group that empowers students to become globally conscious leaders by providing experiences working with communities across the globe. A group of motivated students is assembled to design an engineering solution to a community problem and through a series of assessment, implementation and post implementation trips, they continue to strengthen their contact with the communities to insure their design is both sustainable and applicable to the community's need. With projects underway or set to begin in Willimantic, Hartford, Nicaragua, India, Nepal, and the Dominican Republic, Engineers Without Borders uses student ingenuity to provide sustainable engineering-based solutions to communities in need.

Student Organization Advocacy Award

This award honors a Registered Student Organization for the achievement of a remarkable goal or completion of a major project that significantly impacted students through advocacy or awareness initiatives during the past academic year. This can include, but not be limited to increasing awareness about a particular issue across campus or taking a leadership role in the advancement of an issue or cause on campus. This award was established in 2005 and is sponsored by the Leadership Office.

HuskyTHON


HuskyTHON works tirelessly year round to increase awareness of issues faced by the Connecticut Children's Medical Center. As one of the largest student-run philanthropy efforts in New England, HuskyTHON culminates their efforts in an 18 hour dance marathon fundraiser in March. This event draws in over 2,400 students per year to participate and fundraise. While working to contribute to the support and services offered by the local pediatric hospital, HuskyTHON's Student Management Team and student participants raise money for the center and For The Kids (FTK). This past year, HuskyTHON raised \$560,104.55 to benefit the Connecticut Children's Medical Center.



Andrea Dennis LaVigne Scholarship for Advancing Diversity




Amanda Simon


Andrew Klock
