
Elizabeth Charash

First Year Excellence in Innovation Award

The First Year Excellence in Innovation Award stems from a university-wide initiative to cultivate talent among first year students. This award recognizes a current first year student(s) that has displayed a significant level of innovation and creativity. This award was established in 2015 and is sponsored by the Office of First Year Programs and Learning Communities.

Carson Stifel

Carson is a first-year Communication major, who plans to complete her degree in three years. In addition to being a member of the Innovation House Learning Community, she also runs a photography business, works as a Communication Specialist for [squared labs], and is preparing for a summer internship with UConn's CCEI. Carson is developing a new company, a revolutionary commercial bakery that aims to fight hunger in America by providing affordable, appealing, and nutrient-dense snacks and desserts. Ultimately, Carson hopes her bakery can contribute to increased equality and opportunity for students from disadvantaged backgrounds.



Willis N. Hawley Service and Leadership Award

Willis N. Hawley, (1875-1898), attended Storrs Agricultural College, beginning in the fall of 1895 and soon after graduating in 1898, he joined the U.S. Army, Company H, Third Connecticut Volunteer Infantry. This award recognizes a student veteran(s) who has made significant contributions to the University community through leadership and service during their tenure as a student. This award was established in 2010 and is sponsored by the Office of Veterans Affairs and Military Programs.

Patrick, currently attending UConn's School of Law, has interned at the Connecticut Supreme Court, the Attorney General's Office, and the State's Attorney Office. Patrick left the Army in 2012 and enrolled at UConn as an undergraduate, graduating with a BA in Political Science in 2016. He joined the U.S. Army Intelligence Corps a week after graduating high school, and served in the War on Terror deploying to Afghanistan, Kuwait, Korea, Spain, and Germany. He is the co-founder and current president of the Veterans and Armed Forces Legal Out Reach (VALOR) Society, and helped establish the Veterans' Benefits Legal Clinic at UConn Law.

Gant, former Provost and Professor of Civil Engineering. Edward V. Gant, who also served as the University's acting president for brief periods in the 1960s and '70s, passed away in 1985. The scholarship is granted on the basis of academic excellence, professional potential, dedicated service, and exemplary integrity. The scholarship(s) are awarded to students, graduate and/or undergraduate, who will be continuing their studies at the University of Connecticut next fall.

Graduate Nominee: Erica MacDonald

Erica is a Ph.D. candidate in the Department of Political Science, and serves as a Teaching Assistant for a joint human rights and engineering course. As Associate Director of the Humanities House Learning Community, she is responsible for mentoring first year students who are transitioning to the university. Erica is a research assistant on a new business/human rights program initiative where she coordinated an inaugural two day conference. She has also served as the President of Political Science Graduate Student Association.



Graduate Nominee: Dana Miranda


Joel Thomas

This award was established prior to 2005 and is sponsored by the Department of Student Activities.

Alyssa is a senior double majoring in Sociology & English and serves as the facilitator of “Between Women”. Through her service as a facilitator, Alyssa has hosted discussion groups for LGBTQIA+ and women on campus, including those participating in the Sexual Consent 101 workshops. Since becoming a facilitator of Between Women, Alyssa has increased the participation in this organization, while providing support through purposeful, guided discussions that seek to restore, maintain, and enhance the well-being of women.

It was established in 1969 to recognize a deserving student(s) on the basis of citizenship, need, scholarship, contribution to the University, and contributions to the causes of human rights and human dignity, civil liberties and freedom of thought.

As an activist and leader with the undocumented rights organizations - CT Students for a Dream (C4D) and the national organization - United We Dream, Angelica has played a critical role in addressing educational equity, comprehensive immigration reform, Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA), and other social justice issues at UConn and beyond. In 2017, Angelica assumed the role of the statewide Campaign and Community Organizer for C4D’s #AffordToDream campaign, fighting for undocumented students’ equitable access to institutional aid from public higher education institutions in Connecticut. Angelica was also recently featured in Connecticut’s 40 under 40 magazine class of 2018.



Chris Stumper

Through his involvement as a trip director with community outreach, Chris uses his experiences as a Violence Against Women Prevention Program (VAWPP) facilitator to plan activities related to stereotypes, gender expression, intersectionality, and the history of the LGBTQIAA+ Pride movement. In 2017, Chris worked with 12 LGBTQIAA+ students and designed an interactive curriculum to engender cultural competency for an alternative break trip. Chris encouraged and supported his participants’ to engage in the learning process, by researching and presenting on queer history through movements that are often overlooked.



Organization Community Service Award

This award honors a Registered Student Organization that has initiated and/or actively engaged in a community service project that offered direct service, as opposed to fundraising or lobbying activities, to a community external to the University. This award was established in 2002 and is co-sponsored by the Office of Community Outreach and The Office of Public Engagement.

Honors Across State Borders

Honors Across State Borders is a student-run organization of 54 participants that focuses on the coordination and execution of a yearly alternative spring break trip, a day of service event hosted in the fall semester, large group educational meetings, and additional events throughout the year. This past fall, Honors Across State Borders collaborated with Habitat for Humanity in the greater Springfield, MA, area to refurbish the exterior of the Habitat for Humanity building. This student organization also organized an alternative spring break trip to Tennessee to work with Habitat for Humanity in Williamson-Maury County.

Outstanding Graduate Assistant of the Year

This award recognizes a Graduate Assistant(s) who goes above and beyond their assigned responsibilities by contributing their time, energy, and talents to further the growth and development of undergraduate students on campus. This award was established prior to 2002 and is sponsored by the Graduate School.

Out to Lunch Lecture Series, UConn Rainbow Center

By creating a space that highlights intellectual and advocacy work by members of the LGBTQIA+ community and their allies, Out to Lunch provides educational outreach for the campus community and enhances student experiences and has had an impact on participants and members of the community.

Student Employee Supervisor of the Year

This award was established to recognize permanent staff members of UConn who supervise student employees and to acknowledge these staff members and the work they do. This award was established in 2016 and is sponsored by Student Financial Aid Services.

This can include, but not be limited to, increasing awareness about a particular issue across campus or taking a leadership role in the advancement of an issue or cause on campus. This award was established in 2005 and is sponsored by Leadership & Organizational Development.

Revolution Against Rape (RAR)

Revolution Against Rape (RAR) is an organization that focuses on raising awareness about issues related to sexual assault, while working to eradicate gender based violence on campus and the greater community. This past year, the organization hosted their annual event on campus-- with a new name change. The March to End Victim Blaming is an annual march that concludes with a student speak-out to raise awareness about sexual assault and protest rape culture. By breaking the silence that often surrounds this topic, Revolution Against Rape's March to End Victim Blaming significantly impacted students through advocacy and raising awareness.



Student Employee of the Year

This award honors the outstanding contributions and achievements of students who work on-campus or earn their work-study off-campus in community service positions at agencies with an established Federal Work-Study contract with the University. This award was established in 1998 and is sponsored by Student Financial Aid Services.

Protect Our Pack Award

This award recognizes a student(s) whose actions exemplify the bystander intervention concept of Protect Our Pack. By stepping in, either directly or indirectly the student(s) has aided a member of our community who was in a problematic situation which could involve sexual assault, intimate partner violence, stalking, hazing, harassment, a bias related incident, alcohol or other drugs, depression and/or suicide, or many other dangerous or difficult issues. This award was established in 2017 by the Dean of Students Office to recognize students who exhibit actions which clearly help protect our community members.

The award was first given in 1994 and was established by Louise and Herbert Spirer and Marilyn Dueker, retired faculty members from the University of Connecticut-Stamford campus. This award honors an undergraduate student(s) for outstanding contributions to public service. Recipient(s) will have demonstrated a concern for others that benefits society and impacts positively on their personal and professional life.


Khang Nguyen
